A Message from the Executive Director



Everything we do at OVS is centered around the wellbeing of survivors, including every initiative we have and all the hours our staff and volunteers contribute. We have one goal which is to make sure that everyone impacted by violence, loss, or trauma in

Ottawa feels supported and safe.

Since the start of 2025, OVS has continued to attend important events and engage in conversations which inform best practices in victim support and community safety across the region. I was proud to have presented at the Building Bridges and Preventing Hate Learning Series, hosted by United Way Eastern Ontario and the City of Ottawa to launch the Ottawa Stops Hate Together campaign on the International Day for the Elimination of Racial Discrimination. We shared about our new online hate crime reporting tool. OVS also participated in the National Office for Victims Roundtable on issues in federal corrections and parole in March, as well as attending the National Forum on

Combatting Antisemitism. We also welcomed a new addition of **16 crisis-trained volunteers** during our January training.

These, along with our ongoing staff and volunteer-driven crisis response and outreach, are made possible through the trust of survivors and the generosity of our community. Sylvie's Story in Her Own Words

"With a professional background as a former Military Police officer and a volunteer with the Ottawa Distress Centre,

after retiring, I felt a strong desire to continue serving my community in a meaningful way. Ottawa Victim Services has allowed me to do just that. I have spent the past eight years providing assistance to the organization by offering compassionate support to victims and survivors of crime and tragedy.

My experiences have taught me the importance of empathy, active listening, and resilience. In my personal time, I enjoy long-distance hiking while backpacking in Europe and have walked over 7,500 kms to date—an experience that continues to deepen my appreciation for personal growth and human connection."

As soon as we started our Bingo Charity initiative, Sylvie was on right board to help any which way she can. Raian has shown and outstanding eagerness to support clients at OVS during their most difficult moments. Always responsive to volunteer requests for supports Raian will always try to find a way to make it work. Raian has attended court numerous times providing emotional support to clients but also assisting with Arabic interpretation during the process. Raian exhibits the commitment to her role as a Victim Support Worker that we value so much making this award so fitting for her. Since the beginning of the year, we have continued to strengthen our capacity to support survivors and engage our community in prevention work and safe intervention.

In response to the City of Ottawa and Ottawa Police Service's declaration of Intimate Partner Violence (IPV) as an epidemic, we launched our new campaign: See It, Name It, Change It, generously funded by the City of Ottawa. This campaign has been thoughtfully adapted and urbanized from Lanark County Interval House's rural-based campaign of the same name. The campaign focuses on IPV prevention and early intervention by educating the public and survivors on how to recognize warning signs and respond safely. These resources include tailored tip sheets for individuals, community members, and teachers, especially to support youth who are exposed to or directly impacted by IPV. As part of this campaign, OVS has launched an ad campaign currently running across OC Transpo which has helped make this message visible throughout Ottawa.

In January, we also launched an **Online Hate Crime Reporting Tool**, generously funded by the Ontario government through their Anti-Racism Anti-Hate (ARAH) program. This tool allows hate crime victims and witnesses to document incidents of hate without requiring a police report. Eligible clients may receive emotional support and financial assistance such as counselling, home security items, or assistance with graffiti removal. The tool is available in English, French, and Arabic (the 3 most spoken languages in Ottawa) and is part of our commitment to safer and more inclusive communities.

We are incredibly grateful and send our heartfelt thanks to the City of Ottawa for their **generous donation of** 1,500 9-1-1 cellphones to OVS. These can serve as lifelines for survivors of Intimate Partner Violence (IPV), human trafficking, sexual violence and Gender-Based Violence (GBV), ensuring they can call for help in dangerous and unsafe situations. We also reiterate that IPV has been declared an epidemic in Ottawa, and having these phones to provide survivors with is particularly timely. This initiative is an important step toward making our city safer for women and other marginalized groups and ensuring that no one feels alone in their path towards safety and justice.

We are also very grateful for our ongoing partnership with the Overbrook Bingo Palace as an official charitable gaming partner which helps sustain and grow our volunteer program, funding us with over \$1,500 per month to support our crisis-trained volunteer team.

Lastly, On May 14th, OVS held a volunteer appreciation **dinner** in honour of National Victims and Survivors of Crime Week. The evening brought together our volunteers, board members, and staff to honour the strength and commitment that volunteers show every single hour of every day. It was such a great night where we acknowledged the significant role our volunteers play in supporting survivors 24/7 and to celebrate the collective impact of our team. We thank the Department of Justice Canada for funding this event and Boston Pizza Orleans for sponsoring this event!

Our core services such as crisis intervention, safety planning, and advocacy remain at the heart of what we do, with our dedicated team working hard to ensure that no one facing hardship is left without support. Looking Ahead at OVS

At the end of May, OVS became part of the province-wide Ask for Angela campaign, an initiative and code word designed to provide discreet and immediate support to survivors feeling unsafe from issues such as intimate partner violence (IPV), stalking, or human trafficking.

The goal of this initiative is that anyone experiencing abuse or violence can walk into a Loblaw Companies Limited Banners (Loblaws, Joe Fresh, Real Canadian Superstore, Real Canadian Wholesale Club, Shoppers Drug Mart, No Frills, Valu-Mart, Your Independent Grocers, and Fortinos) and "Ask for Angela". All store staff have been trained on how to respond and will take survivors to a private space to allow them to contact OVS for support. We are grateful to be providing a safe space and connection to resources through this collaborative initiative and hope to provide survivors with the support they need to heal.
